

very day I await a phone call from my husband, Ray.

He is a first responder, working as a nursing home administrator. As a mobile director of operations licensed in several states, he was working several miles from home when the COVID-19 pandemic exploded.

We chat daily on the phone, discussing his staff and patients. I can hear the stress in his voice as he tells me of the emotional strain on one husband who cannot visit his wife of 63 years.

This is our calling. We are all first responders. Our answer to the pandemic is where faith and action intersect. In a world full of hate and divisiveness, we are anointed to bring inclusion and kindness, providing a mantle of gentleness, empathy, and mutual respect.
